

Teaching Guide: Be of No Reputation

Key Text: Philippians 2:7 | Proverbs 31:10–31

1. Opening Premise: The Virtue of Having No Reputation

"But made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men." — Philippians 2:7

- **Jesus modelled humility:** He emptied Himself of glory and reputation to fulfil the Father's will
- Our culture teaches us to curate an image, to prove our worth through titles, beauty, achievements, and platforms.
- But the **Kingdom teaches** the opposite: serve, build, nurture, and let your **works speak at the gates**.

Other Scriptures:

- Matthew 23:11- 12 "The greatest among you will be your servant."
- James 4:10 "Humble yourselves before the Lord, and He will lift you up."
- 1 Peter 5:6 "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that He may lift you up in due time."
- Luke 14:11 "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Key Thought: To "be of no reputation" doesn't mean to be weak, hidden, or voiceless — it means our **value isn't self-promoted** but **God-revealed**.

2. The Proverbs 31 Woman — A Portrait of Strength and Fruitfulness

"Charm is deceitful and beauty is passing, but a woman who fears the Lord, she shall be praised. Give her of the fruit of her hands, and let her own works praise her in the gates." — **Proverbs 31:** 30–31

- She doesn't **seek** a **reputation** her **work** speaks for itself.
- She builds in silence and strength, not self-promotion.
- She is clothed in *strength and honour* (v.25).

• She is **active**, not idle: "She watches over the ways of her household, and does not eat the bread of idleness." (v.27)

Key insights:

- She is involved in **business** buys land and plants a vineyard (v.16).
- She **creates** linen garments and sells them (v.24).
- She **prepares** food and clothing for her household (v.15, 21).
- She strengthens herself physically "She girds herself with strength and strengthens her arms" (v.17).
 - → This speaks of **stewarding her physical body**, being strong to fulfill her calling.

3. Understanding the "Gates" in Biblical Culture

"Her husband is known in the gates, when he sits among the elders of the land." — **Proverbs** 31:23

What Gates Represent:

- **Place of Authority & Influence:** City gates were where elders gathered, where legal matters were settled, and where reputations were established (Ruth 4:1–2, Proverbs 22:22, Deuteronomy 21:19).
- Place of Honour: Those who sat at the gate were men of wisdom and standing.
- Place of Testimony: A woman's works "praise her in the gates" (v.31) → her fruit is seen and testified to publicly.

Scriptures about gates:

- Ruth 4:1–12 Boaz at the gate finalising redemption.
- Proverbs 24:7 Wisdom is too lofty for a fool; he does not open his mouth in the gate.
- Isaiah 62:10 "Go through, go through the gates! Prepare the way for the people."

Key Thought: When you build faithfully in your home and in your God-given role, your **influence reaches the gates** — your reputation is **established by fruit**, not striving.

4. Linen and Frequency — The Garments of Strength and Honour

"She makes linen garments and sells them, and supplies sashes for the merchants." — Proverbs 31:24

- **Linen** in Scripture represents **righteousness and purity** (Revelation 19:8 "the fine linen is the righteous acts of the saints").
- Scientifically, linen carries one of the **highest frequencies** among natural fabrics (~5000 Hz), which is believed to have beneficial effects on the body.

• She clothed others not just physically but with an atmosphere of virtue.

Application: As modern women, we can think intentionally about what we create, cultivate, and clothe others with — spiritually and physically.

5. She Girds Herself with Strength

"She girds herself with strength and strengthens her arms." — Proverbs 31:17

- She was physically strong to carry the weight of her responsibilities.
- Stewarding our **health and strength** isn't vanity it's Biblical.
- She didn't complain about her role she **prepared herself for it**.

6. Modern Culture vs. Biblical Womanhood

- Modern messages often emphasise:
 - "Self-care first."
 - "Do less, rest more."
 - "Don't let anyone expect too much of you."

While **rest is Biblical**, *idleness is not*.

- Proverbs 31 woman worked diligently.
- She was **watchful** over her household.
- She lived for a **higher purpose**, not just personal comfort.

Proverbs 31:27 — "She watches over the ways of her household, and does not eat the bread of idleness."

Key Thought: True godly womanhood is not about **burnout**, but about **fruitfulness**. God's grace **empowers** us to do the work He has called us to.

7. A Woman Who Fears the Lord

- Reputation isn't self-made; it's **God-given**.
- When you fear the Lord:
 - Your fruit speaks for itself.
 - Your household flourishes.
 - Your influence reaches the gates.
 - You don't have to prove yourself God exalts you in due time.
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Proverbs 31:30–31 — "A woman who fears the Lord, she shall be praised. Give her the fruit of her hands, and let her own works praise her in the gates."

Reflection:

Where have I been striving for reputation instead of fruit?

How am I stewarding my home, my strength, and my role?

Activation / Prayer: Declare over yourself the **Proverbs 31 identity** — not through performance but grace.

Closing: Let your "works praise you in the gates" — pray for fruit that speaks.
